The Suite

- A suite is an ordered set of dances that contrast in tempo, meter, and character
- In the Baroque period, the ordering was usually PACSOG:
 - P: Prelude or overture (optional)
 - A: Allemande (a stately German dance in 4/4)
 - C: Courante (a lively French dance in 3/4)
 - \blacktriangleright S: Sarabande (a slow Spanish dance in 3/4)
 - **O**: [Other dances] such as the Minuet, the Bouree, the Polonaise, or the Gavotte (optional)
 - G: Gigue (a fast English dance in 6/8)
- All of the dances are normally in the same key and most are in two-reprise binary form

Bach's Suites

- Although the suite likely originated as instrumental accompaniment for dancing, Bach's suites are stylized compositions that are not intended for dancing
- Bach wrote several sets of suites for keyboard, including his English suites and French Suites
- He also wrote four orchestral suites and a set of unaccompanied suites for solo cello
- His suites feature the careful working out of a small number of characteristic motives
